The Litany of Humility

On December 5th, 2023 in the presence of the Abbot General of the Norbertine Order, Jos Wouters, O. Praem., and Sr. Augustina Vrzalova, O. Praem., Prioress of Doksany and Federation President of the Canonesses of Prémontré, our community elected Mother Mary Oda to succeed Mother Mary Augustine as Prioress of our community.

Mother Mary Augustine, foundress of our community, first served as Superior from our inception in 1997, and then as the Prioress of our community, after the erection of our canonry and the first solemn professions in 2011. We give thanks to God for the firm foundation that she has laid through her teachings and her faithful, selfless, and loving service nurturing our community from its foundation to an established flourishing canonry of Canonesses at the service of our Order of Prémontrè, of our Diocese of Fresno, and of the whole Church.

The election, which was conducted by the Solemnly Professed sisters, was immediately followed by ringing of bells, summoning the whole community to the Chapter Room, where the Abbot General announced the name of the new Prioress. The community then processed to the Choir, while chanting the Te Deum, a traditional hymn of praise and thanksgiving to God. Mother Mary Oda then made a profession of faith and promise of fidelity to the Gospel and Constitutions (1). All of the nuns under vows (simple or solemn) promised obedience to the new superior (2), and exchanged with her the kiss of peace (top). That evening at recreation, much joy was had by all, as we shared stories with our guests (below) and looked toward the future with hope and trust, praising God for the solid foundation laid by our founding Mother and sisters.

Mother Mary Oda graduated from St. Thomas Aquinas college in 2002 and entered the Monastery that same year. Since then, Mother Mary Oda has held various offices in the community, including serving on the Prioress' Council since 2011 and being the Sub-prioress for the six years leading up to the election. We ask prayers for Mother Mary Augustine, Mother Mary Oda and our community as we strive to, each and every day, live our "Fiat" in all things – for the glory of God and the salvation of souls.







With Gratitude for Mother Mary Augustine

"Just let God do."

These words are dear and familiar to the spiritual daughters of a Norbertine Prioress who truly lived what she spoke. When she was born in 1939 on the tropical island of New Caledonia, growing up in an atmosphere that was by no means religious, who would have thought that this little girl, would one day found the first monastery of Premonstratensian Canonesses in North America, governing that contemplative community for over twenty-six years...

She certainly did not. But, following her conversion at the age of 42, Monique Petit, following hours of prayer and meditation, one day said to God with all her heart, "Thy will be done." She never took it back, even though the Lord began to ask greater and greater sacrifices of His daughter, who, though young in faith, was wise with His own wisdom.

One day she was asked by a canon of St. Michael's Abbey, if she would found a community of contemplative nuns, and, praise God, she responded, "If you think I am able, then I am free to do so." The early years the community's existence saw her acting

as superior, novice mistress, cook, seamstress, gardener, guest mistress, construction director... among other things. But above all she was Mother, teaching her daughters many life lessons, practical and spiritual.

In the liturgy there is an antiphon that says, "Surrender to God, and He will do everything for you." This prayer is really at the heart of all that Mother Mary Augustine taught us, day in and day out, and is the foundation upon which our community has been built. As Mother taught us, by surrendering to God one will have to suffer, as Christ suffered, and one will have to constantly choose the narrow gate. But it does not matter. What really matters is the end: that one's whole life gives glory to God and assists in the salvation of souls. The work we do here below is nothing compared to the joy that will be ours in eternity, knowing that we have been faithful to Christ and remained always at His side.

We are blessed by the twenty-six years that we enjoyed under the leadership of our founding Prioress, and we pray that God will reward her abundantly, here and hereafter, for all she has done for us.

Profession of Solemn Vows

DECEMBER 8, 2023

On December 8th, 2023, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Similarly, as a canoness-to-be prostrates before God (top) she, General of our Order, The Most Rev. Jos Wouters (1), Sr. Mary Due to the limited space of our chapel, the profession was attended by only a few family members and nearby friends of our community. It was, nonetheless, a beautiful and very blessed occasion, and was obvious that the Lord, in His loving providence, had specially ordained events to unfold this way.

Our Lady, under the title of the Immaculate Conception, is the patroness of our community, a fitting patroness for those who strive to give their lives totally to God. For she, from the very moment of her existence, gave herself exclusively to Him, being free as she was from any stain of sin and any lesser loves. And, as she was dedicated totally to God and to His Son, Jesus Christ, she completely surrendered her life to Him, even when this meant to accompany her Son Jesus to His passion and death on the cross, and from there to become the Mother of the Church.

Conception of Our Lady, at Holy Mass celebrated by the Abbot like Our Lady, seeks to give herself totally to Him. As she signs her name on the altar in the same place where Jesus Christ, Emmanuelle made her solemn profession at our Monastery. the Son of Mary, is sacrificed every day in Holy Mass (2) she surrenders her life to the Sacred Victim, herself now a victim with Him. Externally symbolized by the ring which she now wears (3), this union with Christ is not for herself alone, but places her at the foot of the Cross with His Mother, there to become a mother of souls. She has been inserted in a special way into the mystery of the Church, and into this particular church, receiving the canonical rochet as a sign of this (4). All this is ratified in the Eucharist, where Christ is present among us as Spouse and Victim, and unites Himself with us in a pure and total way (5).

> May Mary, the Immaculate One, draw all souls to her Son, to Whom they are espoused at baptism, so that, though called to many different vocations, all souls may belong entirely to Him.

PHASE II OF OUR MONASTERY EXPANSION PROJECT:

We remain deeply grateful to all of you who are helping to build our future chapel, which will replace our current chapel, still housed in the twice-expanded converted game room and living room of the property's original 70-year-old ranch home. The current estimated construction cost of Phase II's chapel and wing, interior and exterior, is approximately \$23 million, based on updated schematics and related plans, with about \$18 million required to take the step of commissioning a complete architectural design and blueprints. With over \$10 million raised to date, thanks to the continuing generosity of our dear friends like you, we continue to place all in God's loving providence, trusting that He is blessing all of you, and will raise up our chapel in His perfect timing and according to His holy will.


