# Waiting as Children

#### THE LITURGY OF THE LAST DAYS BEFORE CHRISTMAS

The liturgy of this present time of year is like a huge Advent calendar given to the children of holy Mother Church, as she prepares us to celebrate with the utmost joy and understanding one of the holiest of solemnities, the Nativity of the Lord.

In the slowly darkening days of winter, we stay close to Mary, each day opening up a new little door or pocket containing treasures of chants and readings. Prophecies and New Testament texts prepare us for Christmas and we constantly return to the scene of the Annunciation, when the Virgin conceives and a shoot sprouts from the stump of Jesse.


and patriarchs, we sing the great "O" Antiphons, raising our voices above the pealing of the monastery bell, which rings through the entire "O" Antiphon and Magnificat Canticle at Solemn Vespers every evening.

Leading up to Christmas, we children, who are having a

difficult time waiting, have said time and again in the liturgy, "Come, Lord, do not delay." Holy Mother Church replies: "Let everything within you watch and wait, for the Lord our God draws near" (Dec 18th). "There is no need to be afraid," she says on the 21st, "in five days our Lord will come to us." On Christmas Eve, "Today you will know the Lord is coming, and in the morning you will see His glory" (Invitatory antiphon).

Finally, at the darkest time of the year and in the deepest night, the Light is born, and the voice of the Father permeates the silent night air in the

great Introit for the Mass at Midnight: "Filius meus es tu." And we draw near, welcomed by Mary's smile, to see the glory of God radiating from the face of Jesus Christ. And just as children can hardly believe that Christmas is here, we sing the "Hodie" chants: Today, yes today is Christmas!

C.S. Lewis wrote about the kingdom of Narnia under the rule of the wicked Queen that it was "always winter and never Christmas." This is never the case for us. In a Norbertine community, it is always Christmas and never winter. From the foundation of our Order on Christmas Day 900 years ago, the gift of the Incarnate Word made flesh has been at the heart of our lives. It means that throughout the difficulties and problems the Order has faced over many years, there has always been the gift of hope. This is because our hope is not in something, but in Someone, in our Lord, Jesus Christ. It is the truth that gives us the courage to keep going on our journey with the Lord.

It has been a privilege to visit the community at Tehachapi on several occasions and to witness the palpable joy at the heart of the community as it strives to go forward with the Lord. That joy is only possible because of the hope Christ brings.

The great French Catholic writer Georges Bernanos described the real nature of hope as "despair, overcome." We can hope because we are loved as sons and daughters by a good God who is truly present with us and deeply

engaged in our lives. That is the message of Bethlehem, of the Incarnation.

All of the great Catholic reformers in history had three essential qualities: personal humility; a passion for purifying the Church starting with themselves; and a fidelity to her teaching, all motivated by unselfish, self-sacrificing love. God calls all of us, not just to renew the face of the earth with his Spirit, but to renew the heart of the Church with our lives; to make her young and beautiful, again and again, so that she shines with His love for the world. The Canonesses of Bethlehem Priory live this truth, and so shine as a beacon of love and hope for all of us.

Let us go to the crib at Bethlehem where we find in Jesus the answer to the temptation to despair and be filled with hope. In a Norbertine community, and especially in Bethlehem Priory, it is always Christmas and never winter.



# A New Path Forward

#### OUR MONASTERY BUILDING PROJECT

After consulting experts in the field, meeting with the bishop of our Diocese, and discussing our community's vision for our way of life, we have been advised and have decided to shift the priority of our building project to the completion of our Monastery living quarters, followed by the construction of our Chapel.



- We are grateful to God for the gift of growing vocations to our Community, which has necessitated the expansion of our housing;
- By beginning with the construction of the Monastery living quarters — the lower cost phase of the project — we will be able to break ground much sooner than anticipated, while we continue to design and prepare for the construction of the Chapel, the pinnacle and crown of our Monastery construction.
- Moreover, adjustment in placement and design, including avoiding steeply sloping areas, will significantly reduce earthwork costs, and gracefully place our Monastery and Chapel on natural terrain.

With our new path forward, God willing, we will be able to break ground in 2026.


